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Mentoring

The National Organization of the 100 Black Men of America, Inc., defines mentoring as an individual, personal relationship that is characterized by relevant and focused involvement conducted over a prolonged period of time between a youth and a 100 member. The member provides consistent support, guidance and target activities as the youth grows and matures. Within the framework of this growth and maturity, it is anticipated that the youth will experience difficult and challenging situations that require mentoring. The mentor's goal is to help their respective mentee develop skills and confidence to be responsible for their choices. Emphasis is placed on improved academic skills, career development and social/emotional development.

Mentors are not intended to substitute for your role as a parent, but rather serve as another caring adult presence in their lives. Most of all, mentors provide students with a listening ear, and a unique perspective on the world.

What We Do To Help Keep Your Child Safe

The 100's priority is the safety of the young people who participate in our program. The 100 has adopted the following policies and procedures that are designed with the safety of our mentees in mind:

1. Screened Mentors.

Before matching your child with a member or volunteer mentor, 100BMOGDFW:

- Requires every potential mentor to submit a detailed personal application describing his/her background, interests, and hobbies;
- · Performs a criminal background check on each applicant;
- · Contacts the applicant's employer to confirm employment status;
- · Requires personal references supplied by the applicant; and,
- · Conducts a personal face-to-face interview with the applicant.
- · Requires applicants to attend an in-person training

2. The 100 Black Men of Greater Dallas/Fort Worth, Inc. does not sponsor, endorses or encourages unannounced contact between mentors and students.

Interactions between mentors and students under the 100's mentoring program take place only after the parent or guardian has been informed. As the student's parent or legal guardian, you are invited and encouraged to attend group events. 100BMOGDFW's policy requires both the mentor and the mentee's parent or legal guardian to agree not to initiate or engage in unannounced contact between the mentor and the mentee unless (i) the school/after school program agree that such out-of-program contact is permissible; (ii) Both the mentor and the mentee's parent or legal guardian have consented and provided written notification to the 100.

3. In light of Coronavirus/COVID-19, the 100 Black Men of Greater Dallas / Fort Worth, Inc. is COVID-19 compliant. I hereby release and agree to hold 100 Black Men of Greater Dallas/ Fort Worth harmless from and waive on behalf of myself, my heirs, and any

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personal representatives any and all causes of action, claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses and compensation for damage or loss to myself and/or property that may be caused by any act or that may otherwise arise in any way in connection with any services received from 100 Black Men of Greater Dallas/ Fort Worth.



Mentoring the 100 Way

Mentoring the 100 Way is one of the signature programs of the 100 Black Men of America, Inc. This holistic program addresses the social, emotional and cultural needs of children ages 8-18. Members of the 100 are trained and certified to become mentors, advocates, and role models for the youth within their communities. Through chapter operated one-on-one and group mentoring efforts, our members forge relationships that positively influence our greatest resource, our youth. The program focuses on building essential skills needed to become productive, contributing citizens.

Workshops for children and youth include topics such as:

- Positive Self Identity and Personal Vision
- Life Skills
- Social and Emotional Skills
- Moral Character
- Work Ethic
- Lifelong Learning

Mentoring the 100 Way uses three different techniques:

- 1. 1:1 Mentoring
- 2. Group Mentoring
- 3. Tag Team Mentoring

All techniques focus on being S.M.A.R.T.

Specific: Specific and clearly defined mentoring population

Measurable: Measure and evaluate effectiveness

Attainable: Setting goals that are attainable for the children and mentors

Realistic: Goals should be realistic (makes sense to the mentee) **Target Driven:** The chapter should have a set target of pursuit



SATURDAY LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Mentoring is the cornerstone to all of the 100's programs and the foundation of its premier initiative Saturday Leadership Program (SLP). SLP is an exciting opportunity for young men, 7th-12th grade, to interact with caring adult mentors who are members of the 100 Black Men of Greater Dallas/ Ft Worth chapter. The program is designed to develop youth into leaders by inspiring them to identify personal dreams or goals and build action plans toward achieving them. As a SLP participant, students will grow and develop in challenging individual and team activities that feature both fun and educational field trips as well as opportunities for students to engage in community service.
